INDICTED FOR BRIBERY.

Lumber Man Accused of Offering
\$50 to Girl to Drop Charge.

Samuel Liebowitz, president of
the Consumers Lumber Company of
Stapleton, S. I., who was acquitted
on Thursday of attacking Miss
Lorna Lintern, 19 years old, of 52
Monroe Avenue, Tompkinsville, in
his automobile, was indicted for
bribery by the Richmond County
grand jury at St. George yesterday.
Liebowitz promised to surrender to
District Attorney Walsh today.

According to Mr. Walsh, the in-
dictment was based on charges that
Liebowitz asked Michael Dallesio
and Alexander Brizzi, both of Con-
