Dear Madame:

I am just in receipt of yours of 3rd inst. I hope you send it to Nashville Banner which paper forwarded it to me.

It would take volumes to tell what I think of Senator Lodge. He is a man of great ability and he is highly cultured and scholarly.

But he is a narrow-minded bigot. He vividly represents that terrible thing - the New England Puritanism which spends all its time running up and down the country seeking to regulate the conduct of everybody else. It ruffles too much for the sins of both North and South.

He is a direct descendant of the Hartford Convention which would have taken New England out of the Union in 1814 if the war with England had not ended when it did. At that time Secession was patriotism in New England. In 1860 Secession at the South got to be treason in the estimation of New England. In 1814 New England was in favor of Nullification; but when Southerners advocated that idea at the south New England called it treason.

Lodge proposes to have another series of the "National Tariff" but it is crude, unsatisfactory, inconvenient, after many and many trials. In 1913 his ancestor our National hero General Lee forever smirched it by allowing free tolls passage to our merchants thence through the Panama Canal. Many supporters of Harding who advocate free passage to our ships, the war for the League of Nations while President Wilson got to be spokesman for the League & then the League got this is actually by way of the great abilities of Mr. Wilson & his concessions on his inabilities. We will see & then it comes down to that great man a mile bad writing. I am very truly yours
