Dear Senator:

Permit me to acknowledge receipt of your letters (two) of December 17 and December 19 and to thank you for the enclosed editorials from the Athens Democrat and from the Huntsville Times, which I have reviewed carefully and with interest.

I am writing quite late in the afternoon preparatory to leaving my desk for a period of ten days in search of rest, health, and holiday cheer. It is, therefore, rather difficult to place within the compass of a single letter the many things I should like to say that occur to me after reading your letters. If by any chance you are in Montgomery between now and the convening of the extraordinary session of the Legislature in January, I hope you may find time to come by this office in order that we may discuss these matters of mutual interest rather leisurely. On the contrary, if by any chance my appointments during the month of January take me to North Alabama I shall seek the opportunity of a visit with you at that time.

Relative to the time of the appearance of our Annual Report for the year 1931, I have to say that I sincerely regret the delay. As you recall, it is contemplated in Sections 52 and 83 of the Alabama School Code of 1927 that the Annual Report of the State Board of Education shall be submitted on the first day of December or as early thereafter as practicable. The assembling of the vast amount of data necessary is really a stupendous effort and requires extraordinary diligence and labor on our part so that the Report rarely or never has appeared as early as December first. You no doubt recall that the Report for the year 1930 was placed on the desks of the Senators and Representatives on the second legislative day of the regular session of the Legislature of 1931. This, I believe, is the earliest appearance ever made of the Report.

Frankly, if we might have had in contemplation the assembling of the Legislature in extraordinary session in August of this year, we might have speeded up somewhat the publication of the Report for the year 1931. However, the State Board of Education was not in session from August 27, 1931 until August 9, 1932. According to Section 83 of the School Code authority for the publication of the Report lies with the State Board of Education. Immediately after the meeting of the Board on August 9 of this year our copy was placed in the hands of the printers. It was, of course, a source of regret to us that we were not able to place it on the desks of the Senators and Representatives during the extraordinary session of the Legislature of 1932. I am not advised but it is my opinion that the Report was sidetracked, perhaps not purposely, for the reports of some of the other departments of the State. Please be assured that it was not our purpose or desire to withhold the Report either from the Legislature or from the public.

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It will be impossible now for us to get the 1932 Report on the desks of the Senators and Representatives by January 31. However, if you will indicate to me in advance any information you may happen to desire, it will be our purpose to place this in your possession promptly if it is at all possible to assemble the necessary data.

With reference to the per capita apportionment to the several counties of the state, I have to say that I do not know of any student of educational administration who advocates the per capita apportionment as a sound or altogether desirable basis for the distribution of public school funds. I certainly do not. In general, I think it is a safe assumption that those administrators whose school systems benefit principally from the per capita method of distribution are the only ones who advocate this system.

However, I think you will find that the history of legislation by the states has not been to abandon or to repeal a system of distribution, as for illustration the per capita basis which is imbedded in the constitutions or strongly fixed by practice. Rather, the effort has been to correct any such erroneous basis by improved methods of distribution for the additional funds that have been provided for education during recent years. You can readily understand that the greater the funds provided by the more desirable methods, the less objectionable other methods of distribution become.

I think there are some errors in inference both in your editorial and in the editorial in the Huntsville Times. You seem not to have taken into consideration the fact that only approximately one-half the funds provided by the State come from the old per capita fund. Nor do you seem to have taken into consideration the local funds provided by county and district taxation and other local subsidies. In order to make a thoroughly reliable comparison, it will be necessary to base the comparisons on the calculation of expenditures from identical funds, as for instance the per capita fund or county and district taxation and other local subsidies on the same level or at the same rate.

I realize, of course, that the report of the Brookings Institution with reference to education did not seem to command the serious consideration of the Legislature. I could almost say the Brookings Report with reference to education rather seemed to be in disrepute with the Legislature. However, a careful perusal of the report will disclose the fact that the Brookings people do not approve the methods of distributing public school funds in Alabama. In fact, they suggest a revision of the methods of distribution more radical than I am just now ready to approve.

If there is time at some future opportunity I think we might wish to look quite carefully into the present Equalization and Attendance Funds as approximating at least your own thinking with reference to this very important matter.

The Attendance Fund, though defective in the important regard that the ability of the administrative unit to support education is not taken into consideration, is otherwise a decided improvement over the old per capita method of distribution. Attendance Fund moneys are earned in proportion to the actual attendance in the

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county or in the city as the case may be, but the theory of equality of educational opportunity for people throughout the whole state falls short of realization under the Attendance Fund.

The Equalization Fund, possessing all the good characteristics of the Attendance Fund, goes further and takes into consideration the ability of the administrative unit, that is to say the county or the city, to pay for the schools. It is the only law ever put upon the statute books which openly and frankly recognizes the difficulty we have in our dual system of schools for whites and for blacks. Moreover, it frankly makes an allowance of only one-half as much for the education of the negro child that it does for the education of the white child. The difficulty, of course, in the equalization plan is that the lack of uniformity as to the rate of assessment prevents accurate or altogether satisfactory calculations as to the ability of the administrative unit to support schools. If this correction can ever be made in this particular method of distribution, I think we shall have approximated the solution of this problem as closely as possible.

I realize that the foregoing thoughts thrown together rather hastily may leave you in doubt as to the principles and theories I have endeavored to present. I hope, therefore, that there will be opportunity to go into them in considerable detail at some future time.

Relative to the agricultural schools, I have to say that it is my information that the school at Cuba was established by the Legislature of Alabama not only without consent but over the opposition of this Department - this is true of quite a bit of the educational legislation found upon the statute books of Alabama.

Hoping that it may be of some interest to you I am enclosing herewith the enrollment and the number of teachers employed in each of the agricultural schools for the year 1931-1932. Also I am handing to you copies of the budgets of each of these schools.

If I can be of any further service to you, please command me.
