Obituary

There were times when I thought how are we going to make it, then the answer would come; I'd get on my knees and call the Lord Jesus, he always had an answer."

Mother Horton was loved by everyone she'd meet. She was a kind-hearted lady. She often said she could never turn anyone away from her door. If they were hungry, she'd feed them; if they needed a place to stay, they were welcome; and if they needed money, she tried her best to help them.

Mother Horton is survived by her husband, Mr. Buster Horton, Athens, Alabama; six daughters, Mrs. Lena Mae McWilliams, Mrs. Rosie Mae Southern, Miss Edmmonia Horton and Mrs. Williadean Hawkins, Athens, Alabama; one son, Mr. James Horton, Athens, Alabama; forty-one grand-

children; sixty-five great grandchildren; and two great great grandchildren; one daughter-in-law; four sons-in-law; one sister, Mrs. Lula Wise, Louisville, Kentucky; and one sister-in-law. She said I love all my children, I call them all my children instead of grandchildren. A host of nieces, nephews, relatives and friends.
