

OBITUARY

Deacon Aubrey was called home by his Lord quietly and peacefully on September 23, 1996 at his home.

Aubrey Lee Horton was born September 11, 1901 to the late Willie Horton and Della Gilbert Horton McKinney. Four brothers and three sisters preceded him in death.

He confessed hope in Christ at an early age and joined the Little Zion Missionary Baptist Church. He later moved his membership to the Sweet Home Missionary Baptist Church after serving in the United States Armed Forces during World War II.

He was united in holy wedlock to Anna Phillips on May 24, 1942. To this union eight children were born. One preceded him in death (Lawrence Phillips Horton).

He loved his church and he was loved in return by his church family. His humbling spirit endeared him to everyone that came in contact with him throughout Athens and Limestone County. He was made a deacon by his church in 1947.

He was a member of the of the Senior Choir. His greatest love within the church was the Sunday School. He was superintendent for over 25 years. The Sunday School bestowed the honor of Superintendent Emeritus to him. On April 23, 1994 the city of Athens set aside "Deacon Aubrey L. Horton Day."

Beside his church work, he worked with the Boy Scouts of America and was a chapter member of the American Legion Post 348. He has been a member of the Athelstine Lodge No. 71 of the Free and Accepted Masons for 49 years.

The memory of this humble and loving man will remain in the hearts of his wife, Anna; his daughters, Della (Billy), Margaret (Dale); his sons, Charles, Johnny Wayne (Shirley), Douglas, Harold, Alves; his sisters, Mollie Harris, Georgia Morgan, Nella Moore and Bonnie Bibbs; 17 grandchildren, 7 great-grandchildren; a father-in-law, Mr. Tom Phillips; sisters-in-law, Emma Horton, Cora Phillips, Addie Phillips; brothers-in-law, Fred Phillips, David Phillips, Will Phillips; his nieces and nephews, his cousins, church members and friends.'
