Orphaned at the age of 12, she and her three siblings were raised by "Uncle Noah" and "Aunt Elizabeth" Smith in Prospect, TN. She departed her earthly life on Wednesday, May 2, 2007 at home.

She united in marriage to Ulice Randolph Sr. who preceded her in death. To this union twelve children were born, five preceded her in death, Bobby Randolph, Ray Randolph, Mary Randolph Phillips, Ulice Randolph Jr., and Carrie Randolph Powell.
