Sunday Afternoon

Feb 7, 1937

Dear Dad:

Bill called sooner than I expected yesterday or I would have talked with you, though about nothing in particular except that I would have liked to hear your voice.

They got off this morning just at six o'clock after spending an hour and a half getting ready. I got up with them at four-thirty but dropped back off to sleep and slept until they were ready to leave. The route they take will send them through Vicksburg over a new bridge across the river there and Bill figures he will be in Shreveport, La. tonight -- about a 600 mile drive.

It amazes mother that they have no fears about going to a new city where they know no one but I imagine that it's just what they like. Louis Stokes, the negro simonizer, wanted to drive them out for his meals en route, would sleep in the car and five bucks when they arrived. Bill, I think, was foolish not to take him up, but he was too crowded.

I don't know for certain just when I'll come up to Nashville Tuesday, but will probably take the Pan in the morning and we can return on it at night. I presume you still intend coming home that day. In case you change your plans please let me know at once. You might tell Ryan of my plans, for he can get you to the station in his new Plymouth and be of help.

Had better close this and take mother for a drive.
