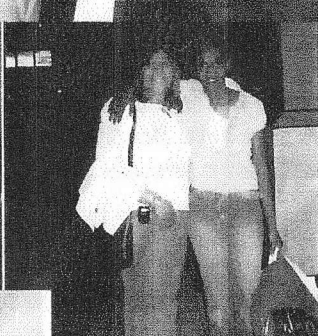


Reggie,
