OBITUARY

On the twentieth day of August, in the year 1914 Marvelene Moseley was born to Edward and Mattie Jack Dawson Moseley in Limestone County, Alabama. On September 30, 1947, in Greenbrier, Alabama, Marvelene Moseley and James Webb were united in marriage. From this union two children were born: Martha Louise and Marva Louis.

At an early age she became a member of Antioch C. P. Church. She later moved her membership to Frazier's Chapel C. M. E. Church (now Frazier C. M. E.). Until hindered by ill health, she worked diligently in the church. Working with the Sunday School brought her special joy. She served as Sunday School superintendent, Sunday School teacher, and as a member of the choir. Singing was another source of pleasure for her, and this was demonstrated frequently by her serving as soloist on numerous programs over the years, and by her membership in the Celestial Choir. Everyone in her church and in the neighborhood knew that Sister Webb was going to church and taking her two girls, even if she had to walk.

Sister Webb was a graduate of Trinity High School in Athens, Alabama, and Alabama A. & M. University, Normal, Alabama. For thirty-nine years she served the people of Limestone County, Alabama as a teacher in the Limestone County School System. Though she taught other places before, and at Elkmont at the time of her retirement, her pride and joy was her first grade at Dogwood Flat. In her capacity as a teacher, the number of young lives on which she had a positive influence are too numerous to count. Many of her students gave her credit for being the source of encouragement that gave them the resolve to continue their education despite adverse conditions. Visits from former students were a special treat during her illness.

Sister Webb was a longtime member of Bethel Court No. 455, Order of Calanthe. She also held membership in the Retired Teachers Association.

Steadfast, humble, full of faith and love; her life is best reflected in the memory of her approach to:
