My dear Harry! - You told
me before I left - to write
you in regard to a few
matters, that I was igno-
rant of, ^{Could not tell you,} ~~Good~~ you sick, &
hated to worry you about any-
thing. ^{at the time} Two years ago last
Xmas you gave me a check
for all you owed me, I
told you, I did not need it -

so, if - you agreed you would
keep all but \$175⁰⁰ (if you took
up your stub, think that in it, &
a deposit of that amount - you will
find in the bank statement I gave
you this Summer) I then had a note
against - you of \$350⁰⁰ you had
the money, the lot - you sold for, and
a payment - ~~my~~ ^{money} ~~that~~ land, I do not remember
that amount; several months ago
you wrote me a letter say-
ing the way you figured it all
up you used me \$800⁰⁰ (the
letter I returned to you, if you
